Everyone connected with Surrey Playing Fields is saddened to hear of the death of Gerry Ceaser, our Chairman, who died on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> February 2018. He became a member of our Advisory Committee in 1998 representing the Surrey Sports Board. Gerry was a past Mayor of Spelthorne Borough Council and has been involved in many initiatives for sport and young people over the years. He was the patron of Surrey Youth Games, has been the Vice Chairman of the South East Regional Sports Board and had been temporary Chairman of the Active Surrey Sports Partnership.

In 2009 he became Chairman of Surrey Playing Fields. His extensive knowledge of local government and sporting bodies allowed us to stay in touch with the aims of our partners as we worked to ensure that there were improvements to playing fields in Surrey.



## **ACTIVE SURREY**

Gerry had a long association with Active Surrey and was a great supporter of our organisation's work. In addition to the Active Surrey Partner Forum, which Gerry chaired from 2013 until his death, Gerry was also Chair of the Active Surrey Board from 2009 to 2013. As Mayor of Spelthorne, he was instrumental in setting up the Surrey Youth Games in 1997 and Chaired the SYG Management Group for nine years before stepping down to become Patron of the Games. He was also Chair of Surrey Playing Fields, working tirelessly to protect and improve green spaces and sports pitches and pavilions for future generations. In the 1990's, Gerry was also Vice Chair of the Regional Sports Board and Chair of the Surrey Sports Board. Active Surrey Director, Campbell Livingston, said "Throughout my time at Active Surrey, Gerry has been a constant presence, providing support, positive challenge and championing our work. Since I took over as Director, Gerry was particularly supportive to me personally and his passing is a great loss to sport in Surrey."

I first came across Gerry when, as Sports Director at the University of Surrey, I was invited to a meeting of Surrey Sport in 1996. Surrey Sport, with Gerry as Chairman, were gearing up for the first Surrey Youth Games and needed the use of some local sports facilities. He struck me as highly opinionated, that he knew exactly what he wanted and was thoroughly determined to overcome anything to get this major initiative happening. He was also adamant to get the best possible value from each and every situation. The London Youth Games had been running for some time and was gaining popularity and growing quickly and Gerry wanted to replicate as much as possible in Surrey. The Surrey Youth Games have been an outstanding success and are now in their 22<sup>nd</sup> year. The aim is to increase participation in Sport by young people who have had limited access to organised sporting opportunities and we can only guess at the staggering number of people who have benefitted over the intervening years. Gerry was always heavily involved in the annual continuation and growth and remained a committed supporter of the Games. Colleagues from Active Surrey will know much more of the detail, so I will not even attempt to cover it here. What I do know is that the sheer numbers involved, the wonderful support of the many essential volunteers and the obvious pleasure shown on the faces of the many young people and their families, were significant drivers in establishing the fundamental design of what eventually became the Surrey Sports Park which opened in 2010 and which grew directly from the old and dated sports provision at the University of Surrey.

Some years later in 2012, after retiring from my University position, I was invited to be part of Surrey Playing Fields, I teamed up once more with Gerry. He was still opinionated, still knew what he wanted and still determined to get the best value from each and every situation. By that time he had already instigated a restructure of Surrey Playing Fields to turn it into the organisation we see today with 12 Borough Development Officers in the 11 Surrey Boroughs.

Talking Sport with Gerry was never an easy conversation. On-going ill health for much of his early years had robbed him of an opportunity to actively take part in Sport as a youngster but he could readily recognise what it had done for many young people and was doubly determined to do all he could to make sure that participation was an option for as many young people as possible. In my humble opinion, he has right royally done that and although we will all miss his constant involvement and wise counsel, the legacy he leaves us with, is massive.
